

Clinical Institute Withdrawal Assessment of Alcohol Scale – Revised (CIWA-Ar)

The Clinical Institute Withdrawal Assessment of Alcohol Scale – Revised (CIWA-Ar) can help determine the need for medically supervised withdrawal management in patients who are able to communicate symptoms to their providers. Research has shown that use of the scale in the treatment of withdrawal reduced the total amount of benzodiazepines needed and shortened the duration of treatment (Pace, 2024). The following scale has been adopted from Sullivan et al., 1989. Add the scores from each category and determine the level of alcohol withdrawal at the end.

NAUSEA a	NAUSEA and VOMITING: Ask "Do you feel sick to your stomach? Have you vomited?"

0	No nausea and no vomiting			
1	Mild nausea with no vomiting

PAROXYSMAL SWEATS: Observation.

ANXIETY: Ask "Do you feel nervous?" Observation.				
0	No anxiety, at ease

AGITATION: Observation

TREMOR: Arms extended and fingers spread apart. Observation

ORIENTA	TION AND CLOUDING OF SENSORIUM: Ask "What day is this? Where are		
you? Wh	o am I?" Count forward by three.		
0	Oriented and can perform serial additions		
1	Cannot perform serial additions or is uncertain about the date		
2	Disoriented for date by no more than 2 calendar days		
3	Disoriented for date by more than 2 calendar days		
4	Disoriented for place and/or person		

Total score is the sum of each item score (maximum score is 67)			
Score:			
Less than 10	Very mild withdrawal		
10 to 15	Mild withdrawal		
16 to 20	Modest withdrawal		
Greater than 20	Severe withdrawal
